

A Note from the **Executive Director**

What a year this has been for all of us! None of us could have predicted this. I wanted to report what Education Elevators has been doing before and during the COVID crisis. Last November, we launched a new partnership between the Mary C. Snow afterschool site at the Bob Burdette Center and Steptoe & Johnson. Bryan Cokeley, the managing partner of Steptoe & Johnson, who is an

Elevator himself, said this, "The single most important thing I got out of being an Elevator is the feeling that I can help make a difference in the life of one child. Education Elevators is an incredible program. If it could continue to be scaled up in the Valley, it would have even more of an impact."

In March, the sky fell and our worlds were turned upside down. The pandemic and its far-reaching effects hit the students in our program especially hard. Mentoring relationships are more critical now than ever. We worked diligently with Kanawha County Board of Education (BOE) to implement a virtual mentoring program. Our Elevators are connecting with students using Schoology, a video conference platform that all students use for schoolwork.

Schoology will also enable our Elevators to provide support to students in middle school. Our program technically ends after elementary school, but we know that students are just starting to form their identities in middle school and it's such a critical time for students to feel supported. We also know that students in middle school report that they have fewer "developmental relationships" than in elementary school. In mid November, we launched our virtual program for middle school students and will continue to work with the BOE to develop a plan for how our Elevators can provide support when students encounter difficulties such as bullying, peer pressure, family discord, or violence, and other emotional trauma.

By using the virtual platform Elevators will support students in 7 elementary schools and 5 middle schools in Kanawha County. In January, we hope to launch our virtual program in one more elementary school in Kanawha County and in several schools in Berkeley County. We also plan on using a virtual platform to provide training to our

We need funds to successfully launch and implement our virtual programs and to develop a curriculum and materials guide for Elevators, designed to cultivate positive youth development and to provide training to
